
CITY OF SAN JOSÉ 2017 HOMELESS CENSUS & SURVEY-EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Every two years, during the last 10 days of January, communities across the country conduct comprehensive counts of the local homeless populations in order to measure the prevalence of homelessness in each local Continuum of Care.

The 2017 City of San José Point-in-Time Count was a community-wide effort conducted on January 24 and 25, 2017. In the weeks following the street count, a survey was administered to 331 unsheltered and sheltered homeless individuals, in order to profile their experience and characteristics.
